Preamble

Are you interested in tracing a rifleman's history? Learning more about The Royal Winnipeg Rifles' history? The purpose of this guide is to connect the user to a variety of **web resources** that document Canadian soldiers' wartime experiences and service.

This guide contains brief wartime backgrounders or contexts about the types of records and resources one can expect to encounter during the research process, from a soldier's service records, death records, awards and honours, gravesites and memorials, to unit histories, war

diaries and battle honours. An annotated list of web links is provided at the end of this guide.

The Royal Winnipeg Rifles' **Official Lineage** through the Directorate of History and Heritage provides a concise, footnoted overview of the unit's history in terms of heraldry, marches, mottoes, battle honours, lineage (including perpetuated battalions), and operational history.



DEVIL IN THE DETAIL:

A common military tradition is for military units/organizations to carry colours, standards, or guidons (pennants) that list their battle honours. Rifle units, however, do not traditionally have colours, therefore, their cap badge may list the regimental honours. Another common element of rifle regiment cap badges: the Maltese Cross.

1885 Campaign

The 90th "Winnipeg" Battalion of Rifles was mobilized for active service on 1885 April 10. The 90th Battalion served as part of General Middleton's Column of the **North West Field Force**, the Canadian government's army raised to fight the armed force of Métis and their First Nations allies. The Battalion was removed from active service on 1885 September 18.

The 1885 Campaign, also known as the 1885 Rebellion/Resistance, Red River Resistance, North West Rebellion/Resistance, to name a few (depending upon the bias, loyalty, or opinion of the user), is where The Royal Winnipeg Rifles

can trace their early traditions. It was during the Battle of Fish Creek that the riflemen in their dark green coats earned the moniker "Little Black Devils" (LBD) and the motto "*Hosti Acie Nominati*" (*transl.* Named by the Enemy). The 1885 campaign was where the LBD earned their first battle honours (Batoche, Fish Creek, Northwest Canada 1885) and composed their regimental song "Pork, Beans, and Hardtack."

The Library and Archives Canada (LAC) is the official archival repository for the Government of Canada and its institutions; Canadian militia records are housed there and many records are digitized and freely available.



DEVIL IN THE DETAIL:

During the 1885 Rebellion, the 90th Battalion had their own newspapermen attached to their unit who would relay, via telegraph, daily accounts. These (albeit biased) reports can be found in the *Manitoba Free Press* and *Winnipeg Tribune*. The souvenir edition of the *Canadian Illustrated War Pictorial* contains the complete nominal roll for the 1885 North West Campaign.

First World War

When war was declared between Britain and Germany in 1914, men rushed to enlist with the newly formed Canadian Expeditionary Force (CEF), the army raised by Canada to serve overseas with Britain. The CEF consisted of fighting arms (i.e., combat arms) and non-fighting arms (i.e., support arms). The fighting arms included artillery, cavalry, engineering, infantry, machine gun, and tank units. The support arms consisted of army service, dental, forestry, labour, medical, ordnance, pay, railway, veterinary corps, etc.

Nominal rolls were compiled for the various CEF units; for a fighting unit/battalion, the nominal roll was published prior to the unit's departure for





overseas. The nominal roll contained a list of the officers, non-commissioned officers (NCOs), and other ranks that enlisted with the unit. Particulars such as soldier's regimental number rank, name, former military service, next of kin, address of next of kin, birthplace, and place of enlistment were also included. Some of the nominal rolls were further organized into companies and sections (e.g., machine gun section, transport section, etc.)



DEVIL IN THE DETAIL:

The 90th Winnipeg Rifles (Little Black Devils) raised five CEF infantry battalions (Bn): **8**th **Bn**, **90**th **Bn** (2nd Draft), **144**th **Bn** (3rd Draft), **190**th **Bn** (4th Draft), and **203**rd **Bn** (5th Draft). The 8th Bn was the first and only LBD unit sent to fight on the Front.




Soldiers who served with the CEF will have a **service file**. These files have been digitized by the Library and Archives Canada (LAC). Service records are searchable under the LAC's online database: **Personnel Records of the First World War**. Service files will contain the enlistee's **Attestation Paper or Officer's Declaration**, Casualty Form – Active Service, as well as potentially other documents including discharge certificates, index cards, medal cards, medical cards or sheets, pay sheets and separation allowances.

To help users interpret CEF service files, the LAC has produced a number of guides and references, including: how to read **Records of Service or Casualty Forms**, **Memorial Cross cards**, and **Medal Cards**, and how to interpret **military abbreviations**.

In addition to soldiers' service files, the LAC houses many **record groups** (RG) pertaining to military units and organizations. The LAC has produced **thematic guides** that help identify LAC records pertinent to each CEF unit.

CEF units contained daily accounts of their "Actions in the Field" in a log known known as a **War Diary**. The **LAC War Diaries of the First World War Database** contains the digitized War Diaries of all CEF units. In the

case of Infantry Diaries, each battalion was responsible for recording field activities from an administrative and operation standpoint; references to individual soldiers were rare. The War Diary will contain a "first-hand record" of where the unit was deployed throughout the course of the war. The level of detail and description for each battalion will vary depending on the officer tasked with maintaining the log. The LAC provides detailed steps on how to search for and interpret content in War Diaries

DEVIL IN THE DETAIL:

Only a fraction of the 260 CEF infantry battalions served directly at The Front. Upon their arrival in England, battalions were primarily absorbed into a reserve battalion, which then fed troops to other Canadian units on the front. The LBD draft battalions were absorbed into the **11**th **Reserve** and **18**th **Reserve** Battalions.

The LAC has also compiled a **First World War section** detailing other LAC sources about the Army, Air Force, Navy, nurses, other records, published sources, and external links – all of which can be accessed through the **LAC's military heritage portal**.

Second World War

Canadian privacy legislation restricts access to Second World War service files. Searchable database and indexes for all those who have served are not publically accessible. Some records for those who died in service are available and searchable through the LAC's Service files of the Second World War War Dead 1939-1947 database.

War diaries for respective Second World War Units are also available through the LAC. These logs will contain information on locations of overseas postings and battles.

War Dead

First World War

Details about a soldier's death may be found in three additional sets of First World War records housed at the LAC:

1) Circumstances of Death Registers, 2) Commonwealth Grave Registers, and 3) Veterans Death Cards or Farm Records.

Circumstances of Death Registers contain information regarding a soldier's death and primary burial site. Unfortunately, death registers for the names beginning with "Sip" to Z are missing.

Graves for CEF members who died in Belgium, France, and the United Kingdom have been recorded in the Imperial/ Commonwealth War Graves Register. LAC Archivists believe these records were compiled after the war from information in the circumstances of death registers and service files. These grave registry forms differ from those posted on the CWCG web site.

If Veterans Affairs Canada was notified about a First World War Veteran's death, a **Death Card** was created. These cards were often stamped "Farm Records" because they were once stored at a federal Experimental Farm. Roughly 130,000 index cards were created by Veterans Affairs who recorded deaths up to the 1960s on these cards.

Canadian Virtual War Memorial

The Canadian Virtual War Memorial (CVWM) is an online registry hosted by Veterans Affairs Canada that contains the names of service men and women who have died since Confederation. The names of the fallen are also crosslinked with their entries in Canada's Books of Remembrance and cemetery plans through the Commonwealth War Graves Commission. The public are invited to submit digital photographs and other images of scanned materials to supplement a soldier's entry.

Books of Remembrance

Canada's **Books of Remembrance** were commissioned by the government of Canada to initially honour the more than 66,000 fallen in the First World War. Additional books were produced to recognize the fallen in other theatres of war. The books are currently on display in the Room of Remembrance in the Visitor Welcome Centre of Parliament Hill until Centre Block renovations are completed.

Web users can consult the online database that links the name of a fallen soldier to his/her digitized page in the respective Book of Remembrance. Pages are also linked to the individual's entry in the Canadian Virtual War Memorial.

Commonwealth War Graves Commission (CWGC)

Established in 1917, the Imperial War Graves Commission, later the Commonwealth War Graves Commission (CWGC), was tasked with recording details of the war dead, securing and maintaining land for cemeteries and memorials, and perpetually commemorating those who died while serving Commonwealth forces in theatres of war.

The CWGC website contains comprehensive information about the CWGC's activities, history and archives, including databases searchable by cemetery or by individual. Many documents have been digitized and may available for download, including: Grave Registration Documents, Grave Registration Reports, Registers, Alternative Commemoration Documents, Burial Returns, Exhumation Reports, Headstone Schedules, Panel Lists, etc.

DEVIL IN THE DETAIL:

At this time (2019), it is not possible to search the CVWM or CWGC by CEF battalion number (e.g. 8th Bn). Researchers searching for soldiers by name should consider variations in spelling.

Canadian Military Memorials Database

The **Canadian Military Memorials Database** is maintained by Veterans Affairs Canada and contains more than 7500 memorials and monuments located in communities throughout Canada. The site is regularly updated as contributors provide information about monuments sites. The database is searchable by province/territory, municipality, and keyword.

War Memorials in Manitoba

The Manitoba Historical Society (MHS) has compiled a comprehensive inventory of military monuments in Manitoba under their feature webpage: War Memorials in Manitoba. In this web feature, the MHS has provided a Monument Search Tool that allows users to search MHS webpages for the names of service members that appear on Manitoba military monuments. Names that do not appear on any monument/memorial in Manitoba have been amassed in Manitoba's Virtual War Memorial, a virtual list curated by researchers of the MHS. The MHS also hosts links to Patrick Morican's report War Memorials in Manitoba, An Artistic Legacy (2013), that contains a review of the history and heritage of more than 200 Manitoba war memorials.

Military Medals, Honours, & Awards

Service (or campaign) medals recognize a time and place of service. Depending on their terms of service, The Winnipeg Rifles were eligible for the Egypt Medal (1884), North West Canada Medal (1885),

South Africa Campaign, 1914-1915 Star, British War Medal (1919), and the Victory Medal (1919). In the Second World War, The Royal Winnipeg Rifles may have received the 1939-1945 Star, Canadian Volunteer Service Medal, Defence Medal (1945), and France and Germany Star, and War Medal 1939-1945. In both theatres of war, valour (or gallantry) decorations could be awarded to individuals who demonstrated courage, such as the Victoria Cross (VC), Distinguished Service Order (DSO), Military Cross (MC), Distinguished Conduct Medal (DCM), and Military Medal (MM). Meritorious service decorations were awarded for exemplary acts. War Service Badges or pins helped distinguished those who served once they had returned to civilian life.

The online Veterans Affairs Canada Medals and Decorations Database provides profiles for badges, medals and ribbons and includes context, eligibility and criteria, description, number issued, and other historical notes.

The LAC Military Medals, Honours and Awards, 1812-1969 Database contains records of citation cards, medal registers, and other records of military awards that is searchable by recipient. For recipients of First World War valour decorations, the London Gazette (LG) often published particulars about a soldier's commendations. This formal announcement was known as being "gazetted" and served as an official record.



DEVIL IN THE DETAIL:

Searches in the LAC Military Medal Database cannot be separated by First and Second World War, nor can the database be searched by CEF Battalion (e.g. 8th Bn).

Other Resources

Cap Badges & Collar Dogs

Since its formation in 1883, The Royal Rifles have held Winnipeg various designations as the militia/reserve unit mobilized for active serve throughout time. With changes in monarch, name, redesignations, and battle honours, so too did the unit's cap badge change. The **British &** Commonwealth Military Insignia **Database** contains photographic examples of military badges and buttons of the British Empire and Commonwealth, including those from the early Canadian militia period.

Newspapers & Local Histories

Local newspapers, such as the Brandon Daily Sun (later the Brandon Sun), Manitoba Free Press (later the Winnipeg Free Press) and the Winnipeg Tribune documented the activities of The Royal Winnipea Rifles. Regimental orders, competition results, deaths, promotions, marriages, military exercises and battlefield accounts are found throughout the pages of these papers, to name a few. The Manitoba Library Consortium's (MLC) "Manitobia," a Manitoba history resource web portal, contains free access to digitized copies newspapers, local histories, and other materials. Some newspaper archives are available through paid subscription services.
